I would like to share my experience while my family was with Family Promise. After being homeless for months and months staying in motels, camping and really struggling I finally found Family Promise. At the time I had no idea the journey I was about to go through.

My whole life I've done everything you're supposed to do, and I've fought hard and pretty much done everything on my own. When you're taking care of a family sometimes you're too proud, but you can't let your pride get in the way because your family is more important. It was really hard for me to let my guard down and become vulnerable.

When Sara Wallace brought us to Family Promise, the pressure taken off my shoulders was unbelievable. Family Promise fed my family. They provided a whole room, blankets, bedding, showers, laundry room and peace for my soul. Sara met with me and mapped out our

journey. I watched this woman go above and beyond for my family. I watched her fight for us, pray for us, advocate for us with everyone that would potentially be an asset for my family. We walked into the program in March 2022 and Family Promise let my

family stay for six months. We graduated in September 2022 with knowledge and confidence and were able to build our savings back up. During that six months Sara and I not only had weekly visits, but she checked in with me every single day.

There were days that were really hard. Feeling like a failure as a mother and a provider was not easy. Family Promise helped me through that. They were a real emotional anchor, assuring me that I am good, and I am OK. Many times, Sara would sense

that I was feeling down when other people wouldn't know, and she was there with inspiring messages and positive affirmations. Not because it was her job, but because it was in her heart and soul. Jamie and other staff genuinely loved us too. My children loved their children, and Jamie was always wanting to do fun children's activities. The kids loved it. It was the most amazing, comfortable, family orientated place.

I will forever be indebted to Family Promise. I'll never be able to put in words my experience and outcome. But I do believe in the journey and the knowledge and experiences, and I feel honored that God found me special enough to be blessed by them. Because the day my family went to Family Promise and the things we experienced reset my soul and I believed in humanity again. I cannot thank this program enough and I cannot stress enough that Jamie and Sara not only are good at their jobs, but they were meant for them.

We now have a home that is perfect for our big family!!! Thank you so much!

This issue we are shifting gears a little and featuring congregations rather than individuals in the spotlight. Kelso United Methodist Presbyterian Church led by Pastor Vonda McFadden and their FPCC partner, Longview United Methodist Church led by Pastor Allison Mattocks are the focus for December.

Both Pastor Allison and Pastor Vonda described their congregations as "older, mature, empty nesters with a long history of attendance". Pastor Vonda also indicated a large number of members in the teaching/education profession which may explain why Family Promise is of such interest to her congregants.

Pastor Allison appreciates that Family Promise provides a full range of services that really helps young families with children get back on their feet. Both pastors appreciate the opportunity Family Promise provides for their volunteers to meet and interact with the guest families and the other congregation, although this has been severely impacted by COVID.

Each pastor has a group of households that handle the purchase of groceries and the preparation and delivery of meals to the Family Center. Pastor Allison indicated there was a great desire from her members to help those with food insecurity. She also noted that dietary restrictions can be challenging to those volunteers not used to dealing with limitations such as food allergies, gluten-free diets and other food related issues. Sometimes the challenge is as simple as actually finding the building entrance or having the correct access code to the door.

Pastor Vonda expressed her great joy when a newly graduating family was given a host of gifts at Christmas to help them establish their new home. She said it was a wonderful experience and "it highlights the difference we can make in people's lives".

Each pastor appreciates the Family Center where guest families are currently housed but look forward to a time when expansion is complete in order to accommodate additional families and also a time when health restrictions can foster more contact between volunteers and families.

Family Promise is a means for people of all walks to get to know one another, and for families with children in need to find the housing and practical help they need to reenter the community.





#### What We Do

Family Promise of Cowlitz County is a family shelter program focusing on consistency and stabilization for families with children or as we like to say children with families. FPCC provides hot meals, shelter, basic necessities, connections to local resources, housing and financial planning, referrals, financial assistance, intensive case management, and anything from furniture donations to moving assistance.

We now operate a non-rotational shelter: meaning we no longer rotate housing amongst our church partners. We use what was once known as the "day center" as our Family Center. When using the rotational model, the congregations took on a huge part of what it takes to manage a shelter program, feeding and housing the families in their buildings. However, the numbers show that stability and staying in one place while un-housed leads to quicker, more successful graduations from homelessness. We still utilize the support of the local congregations to deliver these families a homelike experience as they go

through one of the hardest times of their lives. It's not only delivering dinners or providing basic needs and shelter. It's the sense of community, the feeling of independence.

There is a sense of self dignity that is stolen the moment you become un-housed. FPCC provides the tools for these families to become stronger, more independent and persevere by helping to educate them about local resources in order to achieve some security. And once you have a stable living space, you can begin to draft a plan for the future. Sitting at a table with a Pastor, or a teacher in the community where they will be living gives a sense of being part of something meaningful, giving back some self-respect, and not feeling like the homeless family that is somehow inferior because of what has happened.

If there is a need, with the help of this entire community anything is possible, any need can be met. That is the most amazing part. Not money or "stuff", but if we all join together there is no unachievable goal, no burden too great to carry. It's the things you cannot see, things money can't buy, the feelings, the hope, faith and compassion that our staff and volunteers provide to families that truly defines success. Going through the program and coming out with the trust, love and support of the local people is the true prize and secret that FPCC embraces. Community Togetherness.



# FamilyPromise



In October, Family Promise of Cowlitz County participated in a program to raise awareness (and funds) for our affiliate through an event called "Night Without a Bed".

The National Family Promise organization has been leading the challenge for people all around the nation to spend one night sleeping somewhere other than their own beds. People sleep on couches, in tents, in their church (you get the picture) in order to create a better understanding of what it feels like to be without a warm, comfortable bed to take refuge and recharge in nightly.

Our goal was to create more awareness amongst the young people in our county, so we invited the local church youth groups to ask their members to participate by posting their pictures with the hashtag #NWAB or #NightWithoutABed.

We will continue to build on this momentum in 2023 by increased outreach to our youth groups as well as leadership clubs at the local schools. Having our youth "walk a mile in my shoes" regarding the challenges and experiences of peers who may be without shelter can lead to increased understanding and less judgement. This is the kindness and goodness we want to foster through outreach and education.

Every child deserves to have a home. Please put October 2023 on your calendar now and help us continue to raise awareness in our community.
